


- Take trips to the library.

Accelerated Reader

- STAR Testing-measures reading comprehension
- Diagnostic Report-results from the STAR Test
- Scaled Score (SS)-The scaled score is figured based on the difficulty of the questions as well of the number of questions that were correct (Scale range of 0-1400).
- Percentile Rank (PR)- The percentile rank allows students to be compared to other students nationally that are in the same grade.
- Grade Equivalent (GE) The grade equivalent represents how a student does compared to other students nationally.
- Zone of Proximal Development (ZPD)—
 This is the range of readability which
 a student should be required to select
 books. Reading in this range provides
 students with the optimal opportunity
 to maximize reading growth.

► Why is Reading Important?

- ⇒ Fundamental to functioning in our daily life
- ⇒ Helps develop a good self-image
- ⇒ Develops your mind like a muscle
- ⇒ Builds knowledge and imagination
- ⇒ It is the building blocks of life



How Can I help with Oral Reading?

Use "Good Fit" books
*Choose books that they enjoy
*Their grade level

Understand the terms of fluency

*Phrasing-read smoothly , not like a robot

*Expression-read with feelings keeping character in mind

*Rate-read like we talk (not too fast or too slow)

Punctuation-brief stop at periods and pause at commas

*Accuracy-reading words correctly pause at commas

Decoding-apply the knowledge of letter sound formation and letter patterns to correctly sound words out.

Word Strategies- use flashcards, a journal, sticky notes, to write down unfamiliar words. Use dictionary.com to hear the pronunciation.

Tracking- Encourage them to follow first with their finger, then a bookmarker, and lastly their eyes.

Read Together-Share (taking turns) Choral (together) Echo (you read, then they repeat)

How Can I help with Reading Comprehension?

Ask questions-connect prior knowledge to the learning process, predict, make educated guesses, etc.

Paint a picture-Create images of what is being said.

Find textual cues and text organization - to help understand what is read.

Summarize-periodically have your child explain what is happening in the story and give the main idea at the end.
